


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Introduction

SUYASHA SENGUPTA

Sexuality and mental health are two of the most taboo topics in India right now. To talk about it we need guts and to sing about it we need Plastic Parvati aka Suyasha Sengupta.

Suyasha, a member of the Kolkata band 'Ganesh Talkies' recently released her solo album 'Songs About Lovers', an exploration of the masculine/feminine dynamic through sexuality and her struggles with mental health. We spoke to Suyasha about the story behind her new moniker, her album and singing about taboo topics.

1. What's the story behind your artist name – Plastic Parvati?

Parvati is the Hindu goddess of love; and the main essence of my solo project is to chronicle my experiences with love, sexuality and mental health. Plastic signifies, well, modern life and all the works. Hence the name 'Plastic Parvati'.

2. What inspired you to release a solo album?

I think it came out of having all these feelings inside me which I just wanted to get out of my system. Miti Adhikari who's a mentor to me, helped me arrange, produce and finish my songlets.



05 06 3. How is the music you write for the Ganesh Talkies different from your solo stuff?

When the band is involved, I'm essentially the mouthpiece for an idea that all of have collectively whereas with my solo record, the feelings are intimate and very personal.

4. Did you get any flak for writing and singing about taboo topics like sexuality and mental health?

I've reached a point where I don't necessarily care about the opinions of strangers. These are the thoughts in my head and I'm only saying them out aloud. The only way to normalise so-called "taboos" is to talk about it till we reach a point when it no longer makes people uncomfortable.

5. Tell us a little more about your songs 'Head' and 'Straight Outta Coshba'

'Straight Outta Coshba' is an introduction to who I am. I have lived and grown up in Kasba, Calcutta and the environment around me influences me greatly. The song is an homage to the crazy/beautiful vibe of the place. It's a place where all religious and socio-political classes coexist in harmony; it's a sort of lesson for the country considering the current atmosphere of intolerance. My space allows me to contemplate, and the musings that come out of it are usually the songs that I write. 'Head' is a slightly naughty song where I'm thinking out aloud if a previous relationship failed because of something I did wrong or because I wasn't good at giving oral sex.

Again, when it comes to female sexuality, it is very difficult to find music by women who are empowering themselves. It's very easy to fall into

a trap of self-objectification, something that I have consciously tried to avoid in this record.

6. What advice would you give to young girls going through the struggle of expressing themselves

Plays address everything from the stories of Indian forefathers to societal issues in modern India. In this section, meet the 'who's who' of theatre personalities in Kolkata.



In conversation with Ayan Bhattacharjee

Ayan Bhattarcharjee is a creative producer, actor and light designer at Mad About Drama (M.A.D.), a performance art theatre in Kolkata which specialises in 'mad theatre'. M.A.D. is always pushing the envelope to challenge the status quo.

Here, Ayan talks to us about his passion for the performing arts, his views on theatre and its technicalities, the upcoming theatre culture in Kolkata and more.

1. Tell us a little bit about yourself and your background.

I started out with theatre in my school days itself, in Don Bosco. It was since then that my passion for the performing arts began and later on inspired me to start Mad About Drama. We have been running for over 7 years now. It started out as a hobby which developed into a profession.

2. What sparked your interest in theatre and what does the stage mean to you?

I was pretty much involved in theatre activities in school. Sometime in primary school, there was an elocution contest

where a teacher really liked the way I spoke and I consider that as my starting point. It was a very step by step process. I started in school and built on from there. When I started college, I started watching plays and doing plays. Once you go up on stage and start performing, it becomes addictive because you can really feel the audience's presence, feelings and reactions. It's very different from media like film.

3. In your experience as a light designer, could you please shed some light on how the lighting of a stage plays a role in setting a scene? (Pun intended)

Without lights, whatever happens on stage cannot be seen. It is meant to sensuate a production rather than add to it. The purpose of lighting varies from production to production and play to play.

4. Is there a particular play, musical or movie which inspired you to start acting? What was it about that play/musical/ movie which spoke to you?

No particular film as such but to an extent, The Godfather, way back when I was in high school. But back then, I really hadn't watched a lot of plays, it was just that we really enjoyed watching good acting in movies. It started from there and that's where I truly got into the idea of the performing arts.

5. Why do you think the world needs theatre?

Some plays are meant to be socially relevant, meant to bring awareness and promote social causes. This relevance of theatre is very geographical and very circumstantial. For instance, in countries like Dubai, theatre is considered a luxury, where tickets are costlier than movies. An example would be Hamilton, the most expensive play as of now.

6. What do you think of the theatre culture in Kolkata and where do you see it heading?

Definitely improving. It was booming in the 70's , 80's and 90's. It died down a bit during the millennial age for a while. Over a period of time, with the advent of smartphones, there was an influx of Western ideologies and a lot of Western practices in Kolkata. There is still a very distinct commercial theatre circuit and a very distinct parallel theatre circuit and MAD tries to balance between the two.


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7. Any words to inspire those passionate about pursuing theatre in Kolkata?


Places to Learn Mad About Drama


M.A.D. is a theatre organisation which does not follow normal conventions and aesthetics and is always pushing the envelope to try the untested and making their productions a 'mad' theatre experience. From promotional campaigns to training programs and their plays, Mad About Drama believes in exploring contradictions in our time.

Other than putting on productions, they also have workshops and projects to promote the idea of 'mad theatre', including a kids programme. Their Youtube channel also has humorous content which includes parody news shows, social experiments and music.

They even have a radio show on 91.9 Friends FM every Sunday from 3 to 4 pm, where they perform skits with the use of just dialogue.

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Places to Learn Nandikar Theatre

Nandikar can be considered as the 'Mecca' of the theatre movement in Kolkata. Since its inception, 58 years ago, Nandikar has produced about 80 plays and performed approximately 8500 shows around the country. Their logo was designed by veteran Indian filmmaker Satyajit Ray.

A few of their productions such as Natyakarer Sandhane Chhati Charitra, Tin Poysar Pala, Bhalomanush, Football, Antigone, etc., have been performed for more than 400 nights each. Nandikar has also been organizing a film festival every year for the last 33 years.

Although they are an award-winning theatre powerhouse, they have also

opened an institute for the theatrical arts with training programs and workshops with the ideology that anyone from actors to regular college goers and kids can hone their skills.

Short + Sweet Theatre Festival

Short + Sweet is an event which happens all over the world. It was founded in 2002 in Sydney, with just the theatre component being active. Since, Kolkata is one of the most culturally diverse cities in India, the Short + Sweet Theatre Festival was introduced there in 2016.

Its unique concept and popularity has spread throughout and as a result, has brought participants from different places and countries like Mumbai, Dubai and Bengaluru.

The idea is simplistic, yet unconventional in nature. The participants have to perform a 10 minute play to provide a platform for theatre groups to showcase their acting and directing skills as well as to test their ability to write a 10 minute play. It consists of a preliminary round and one gala curtain raiser. It has different categories mainly; actor, script, theatre group and director. It features a variety of plays and are performed in English, Hindi and Bengali.

Dance, the language of expression, is not only elegant and powerful, it's an eloquent way to narrate thousands of stories. Kolkata's dancers express themselves through various dance forms which range from ballet to Bharatnatyam. In this section, discover the personalities and companies at the forefront of dance culture in the city.



In conversation with

Mr. Tapas Das

Tapas Das is a prolific dancer born and brought up in Kolkata. He is the founder of Twists N Turns, Zumba Kolkata, ArtistWala.com and India International Dance Institute. He began with Twists N Turns back in 2005 with just 40 students and has come a long way since.

Originally a hip hop dancer, he has also been active with the Salsa Indian Congress and various International Salsa Congresses. Here is what he had to say about his journey as a dancer.

1. Tell us a little bit about yourself and your background.

I was born and brought up in Kolkata, and have been dancing since the age of four. I learnt jazz/modern and contemporary dance and built my dance career from there. I went to the Broadway Dance Center, Alvin Alley and Steps on Broadway, all in New York to expand on various dance forms. After that exposure, I studied how to be a dance teacher, which helped me impart this knowledge about dance. I started Twist N Turns in 2005 as I wanted to start my own, one-of-a-kind dance academy.

2. What is your favourite style of dance and why?



Old school Hip Hop. I started my journey as a hip-hop dancer, hence it is my favourite form.

3. Where does the passion for teaching dance derive from?

It is the contentment I get from dance, which keeps me going and helps me in taking it further for generations. Teaching itself is very gratifying. The satisfaction and thrill of achievement is right in front of me: my students.

4. Any words for those looking to pursue dance as a career?

Savage rivalry exists among expert artists for occupations, and work hours are very unpredictable and may incorporate days of practice taken over by nights of execution, and at times seven days a week.

Artists must show inventiveness, collaboration and tirelessness.

5. What do you think of the dance culture in Kolkata and where do you see it heading?

The dance culture in Kolkata is growing day by day. Kolkata, being the hub of talents has one of the finest dancers and artists. The city is now open to new dance styles. Thanks to the reality shows, people nowadays know the different dance forms better than before. The parents are also expanding their horizons and letting their children explore theirs.

Plus. the youth in Kolkata right now, is mostly attracted to the hip hop culture. Many underground battles and dance fests are organised to showcase the hidden talents of the city.

6. You are the founder of a few prominent

dance institutions in Kolkata. What inspired you to start all of these institutes?

I started Twist N Turns so that people can come and learn the techniques of the dance forms, which makes their base strong.

When I felt that there should be trained teachers to guide the children about the minute details of the form, I started India International Dance Institute. The motive of this was to train dancers in different dance

forms like hip hop, salsa, bachata, jazz etc. who would later become certified instructors.

The course has been designed keeping every detail in mind for the betterment of the dancers, so that they will be able to complete the certification, and they will be eligible to take classes in any dance institute.

In Profile Dr. Mitul Sengupta

Dr. Mitul Sengupta started her dance career at the age of 5 and has been taught by Kathak dance prodigies such as Birju Maharaj, Madhumita Roy and Chetna Jalan. She was the recipient of National Nritya Shiromani Award for her contribution to Kathak dance.

She has conducted workshops and master classes in over 20 dance institutions and dance companies, performed at events around the world and collaborated with Indian as well as international artists.

Sri Goutam Upadhyay is an established Bharatnatyam dancer and a 'Chaau' dancer which is a dance form which incorporates three different styles of dance; Mayurbhanj, Seraikella and Purulia. It mixes semi classical Indian dance with martial, tribal and folk dance

Before starting Srijak, the contemporary art centre, he was a faculty member of the Ananda Shankar Centre for Performing Arts from 1988 to 2011. In this period, he has performed in USA, Russia and Qatar. He has also assisted the renowned Bengali dancer, Smt. Tanushree Shankar, in many of her creative compositions at various national-level youth and folk festivals, as well as in the National Games.

His reputation as a classical dancer and choreographer is known throughout the Indian subcontinent. Srijak can be considered as his testimony to his devotion to teaching the art form to his students.

Not unlike her husband, Rupa Upadhyay is one of the most creative minds in the Kolkata dance circuit. She is the co-founder of Srjiak, an institution which specialises in creative dance and elocution.

Other than being a gifted dancer, she is also a brilliant elocutionist and has taken the institution to new heights with her vast experience in the field. She also represented the National Cadet Corps (NCC) that won the 'Best Turn-Out" award at the Republic Day celebrations in New Delhi in 1989.

Rupa is a true believer in the dance style of the legendary dancer Uday Shankar and incorporates it in her choreography and performances. Among her memorable performances, one that stands out was the one aired on Kolkata Doordarshan, when she performed at the Wills World Cup, Youth Festival, Kolkata in 1996.

Sudipta Kundu is the founder of the dance institute Peddro's Salsateca and a member of the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing, London for Latin American Dance. He is a senior fellow in the ministry of culture for his research in dance theatre.




1. Tell us a little bit about yourself and your journey as an artist.

I am an illustrator and a graphic designer based in Kolkata.

I have been painting since childhood. I started illustrating for books when I joined college. I started Saintbrush Artzine in 2015 to help people sustain the love for art.

2. What inspired you to launch the Saintbrush Artzine? What do you hope to get back from this?

After the advent of pages likes Berlin ArtParasites, the whole concept of pairing a picture with a piece of writing



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took over social media for a while.

We wanted to do something similar. We needed a narrative similar in Kolkata, which would essentially bring together the artists, writers, poets and photographers.

It was started with my group of friends, who were artists, jamming together to create something.

What I hope to get back from this is collaborating with like minded people and seeing the art culture develop in Kolkata.

3. Is there one particular piece of artwork on your site which spoke to you?

There was a piece called "In Defence of Pineapple on Pizza", which was featured from the first print issue, which dealt with identity issues and alienation. It spoke to me because of how people hate on other people who prefer pineapple toppings on pizza. This irony works on so many areas.


In this age, where there is so much spoken about on what kind of meat a person prefers to eat and a particular meat which one is not supposed to eat as directed by a particular political party, it's essential to notice that even in our most liberal spaces, we make fun of someone who prefers pineapple toppings on pizza but at the same time we are also standing up against our freedom to eat when politics is concerned. This piece was very interesting piece and it made me reevaluate my political stance.

4. Why do you think it is important for people to express themselves and their thoughts through art?

It's important for people to express themselves through their art because it's a piece that stays forever. Whether you create a piece of art, or write something, or even put up something on social media, it stays forever. What you are

feeling in the moment and the thought behind any piece of art sticks with you through that piece of art. In today's day and age, it's important to mobilise artists and let them express their views and their political stances because art does have a larger impact than just generally talking about it. that each person has an individual style and an individual taste and an individual way of expressing. That originality and individualism shouldn't disappear. But a little general advice to illustrators, realism is very overrated. Everyone has their own style and they should run with it.




Art Galleries in Focus **Experimenter Gallery**


